


Jobs in the health and social sector now account for more than 10% of total employment in most OECD countries

Employment in health and social work as a share of total employment




Employment growth by sector between 2000 and 2015 (or nearest year), OECD average




Women's share of employment in the health and social sector versus total employment (%)





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
Occupational categories (WHO 2010)

Relevance of HR development

- Production of health services is labour intensive
- HR as "the most important of the health system's inputs"
- HR accounts for a large proportion of health sector budgets (60-80%)
- HR are an essential factor for quality of care, patient satisfaction, or in other words health outcomes
