Synthesis mandate

- Objective: How is research evidence taken up into policy and national decision-making?
- Scope: 15 Research projects in the thematic fields of Public Health from the r4d Programme, funded by the Swiss Agency for Development and Cooperation (SDC) and the Swiss National Science Foundation (SNSF) during the period 2012–2022
- Synthesis work: from September 2019 onwards conducted by Swiss TPH, mandated by the r4d programme



Methods

• Methods:

- Interviews with Pls/Co-Pls of r4d projects
- Semi-structured interview guide

Key questions:

- How were stakeholders involved in the research project?
- Was there uptake of research evidence in national/international policies?


Analysis:



Results

Three strategies identified:

- (S1) Stakeholders directly engaged with and sought evidence from researchers;
- > (S2) Stakeholders were **involved in the design** and throughout the **implementation** of the research project; and
- > (S3) Stakeholders engaged in **participatory** and transdisciplinary research approaches to **co-produce knowledge** and inform policy.



S1: Stakeholders directly engaged with and sought evidence from researchers

The research team was approached by international stakeholders, based on the publication of their study protocol.

Enabling factors:

- Raising awareness on planned research: publishing in peer-reviewed journals (study protocol, results)
- Importance of the timeliness and relevance of findings and the production of credible and trustworthy reports



S2: Stakeholders were involved in the design and throughout the implementation of the research project

Policy uptake is facilitated through stakeholder engagement from the beginning as well as during the conduct of research activities, through participating at workshops or functioning in the governance of the projects.

Enabling factors:

- Constant collaboration with an advisory and steering group composed of diverse stakeholders, including policy-makers, from early on
- Locally led and demand-driven research => strengthening local research capacities and institutions, investing in research that is aligned with national research priorities

S3: Stakeholders engaged in participatory and transdisciplinary research approaches to co-produce knowledge and inform policy


The research questions, design and intervention approaches arose through community and stakeholder co-creation and participation.

Enabling factors:

- Co-learning and work across the local policy landscape minimized impacts of unequal power dynamics through equal partnerships
- Collaborative efforts of various stakeholders enabled establishment of a shared vision for supportive health systems.



Reflections from SNSF/r4d programme



Structural «push» for projects to contribute to r4d programme goals:

- 57 transnational, interdisciplinary and transdisciplinary projects
- Theory of Change and Communication Strategy key elements of the proposal
- 10-15% of global project budget to be spent on communication

Learning and responsiveness within r4d programme framework (10 years):

- r4d Skills events series
- Calls for communication products
- 13 cross-project synthesis projects
- 13 Transformation Accelerating Initiatives


- r4d Lunches: 1.5h lunch events, input by r4d project, selected non-academic audience

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Conclusions

- Key to support capacity-building activities for researchers to engage in communication and dissemination activities
- Crucial to make use of existing platforms and social media (twitter, media, facebook) or to provide additional platforms, such as the k4d featuring project results, highlighting stories selected and portrayed by communication professionals (reducing burden/ time investment)
- Important to provide an enabling funding environment (long-term project setup, ToC, comm/dissemination budget)
